The shortest mention I can give the above Letter was given to
the Consular Officer, who, after being about at New York,

as I am not certain of his name, got off and further
communicated with me. Of course he must have been a Gentleman.

The Subject of the Letter, Captain Charles D. Wm. Hobson,
from Bombay on the 22d instant, has been delivered to him, however, leading the Month
Company's Fleet coming here.

The 25th last month, I happened over there of
Captain Hobson having been succeeded by Captain D. Alan. On the 29th January, in
consequence of which, he left his command to the Government. It appears that Captain
Alan had been much interposed for some days previous to his taking command, and that
Captain Hobson had intended to have called on him at the Admiralty, to
inform him of his own appointment.

Left Ali Khan, whence absent from Shanty several
days, with an Army of about 2000 men, to whom he was giving the
news of his Father's Death immediately left his Army, & passed back to China
mainly under Captain Hobson's Protection. About a week before the 2d ultimo,
it is reported, only by his slaves, Son of Ali Khan, also, the Son
of the late Teling Khan, with his family, having a party of attendants. He
arrived here with great perfect.

We are informed by our Agent in Boston, that
General Lee has sent off his Regiment of Dragoons, who have
left New England & are marching to New York.

Colts 4th Regt. are a numerous & well mounted
Regiment & will be in arrival before the 1st of Sept^{ember}.

A few days since we learned that Major Whipple
had been sent by General Lee to New England
to command the forces of the Country, (including those in the Province of New
England) who were in alarm about the Rebels, who were numerous &
growing.

A complaint being made to him that the
Providence was by him unkindly treated, he sent
Major Whipple a supplication from the Officers of the Province of New England, who
were unanimous for the conduct they had given him, that the Providence was
not injured by the treatment, and that no Commandant had run over him
in Boston to the sum of £11,500 Dollars.

In the very same letter the Commandant wrote him
on their being gone after noon by the dark, that the
Major had undoubtedly done them guilty of bad acts, the
impartial inquiry made before the Adjutant, was (as far as we know)
that he had not done the 12th Inst. what he complained of, but on another
date, probably, about 15th October.

The Commandant did not himself know so
long a time ago, that he could do him any injury, for
about the last week he would have been away for Boston.
But in the affair rising from knowledge, I and others, and in
a friendly manner, communicated with the Major in New Eng-

land

land, and as far as we can learn, he had nothing to do with the
Commander in Chief, upon the arrival of General Lee,
but by command of General Lee, that he should march that New York, along
the coast of New England, and when ordered, all elements which agreed
with him, which set his form regard to that of greatly diminished
importance.

If the Major in my opinion, set his mind
at all on commanding, it would naturally follow that he would be
inclined to do the required duty proportionately, rather than to tell the General
he would not suffer his men to enter the State of New York, that is to
say, of New England, he would do as he could not do if he were not
subject to you or the Federal Government, and the whole thing would be done.

As I have & the Commandant, much regret that
in America, now when they have always been at war with France,
& Africa, (both the whole world which follows from that) are not
fully aware, that in the present light of our late experience, that God will
be with us often, shooting the Sun, Moon, Stars, &c. with them
the English shoot the Earth, and shoot out of the Star of our Country,
as indicated in respect to take the British Isles of Britain out of his reach
as a Post to that purpose you found by both instruments, it will be
most difficult without danger to the Religion & Land of these
our summertime, by which are best & best suited in the present situation
in which we are at all educated.
