RESOLVED UNANIMOUSLY, that the following
Minute be laid before the General Court
to be held To-morrow.

THE Court of Directors having in Consequence of the Recom-
mendation of the late General Court, held the 24th of January
last, obtained from the Lords of the Treasury the Explanation therein
desired, have drawn up the following Propositions, which concur, as
they apprehend, with their Lordships' Explanation; and they submit
the same to the Consideration of the General Court.

I. THAT £400,000 a Year be continued to the Public for Five
Years, from the 1st February Instant.

II. THAT

II. THAT the Company be at Liberty to increase their Dividend to 12½ per Cent. during the said Term, but not to exceed One per Cent. in any one Year.

III. THAT if the Company shall, during the said Term, be obliged to reduce their Dividends, from any Cause whatsoever, in such case there shall be deducted from the Sum agreed to be paid for the Use of the Public, a Sum equal to such Reduction; and in like Manner, if the Company's Dividends shall at any Time, during the said Term, be again raised or restored, the Public shall receive equal Benefit; but if the said Dividends shall be reduced to Six per Cent. then the Payment to the Public shall be discontinued.

IV. THAT the Company shall be obliged to export, in every Year during the Continuance of this Agreement, Goods and Merchandise, of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Great-Britain (Military and Naval Stores excepted) of the like Value as they shall appear to have exported annually, on an Average of five Years preceding this Agreement.

V. THAT if any Surplus of Cash shall remain in England, during the said Term, after the Discharge of the Company's Simple Contract Debts, bearing Interest, and the Reduction of the Company's Bond Debt, to the Debt which shall be due from the Public to the Company, then such Surplus shall be lent to the Public at 2 per Cent. per Annum.

THAT any Person borne on the Ship's Books as Part of her Complement who shall be discharged in India, China, or St. Helena, without the Permission of the Company's President and Council, or other Agents, in Writing, or collusively permitted to leave the Ship, shall be considered as coming under the Description of the Clause in the Charter-Party; and the Commander in Addition to that Penalty shall forfeit the Sum of Three Hundred Pounds.

THAT if a Commander shall employ any others, or a greater Number of Mates or principal Officers, or Servants, than those now enumerated, he be fined for every such Excess the Sum of Seventy Pounds.

THAT a Commander who shall carry out or bring home any Passenger or Persons without the Leave of the Court of Directors, or such Persons as are empowered by the Court to grant Permission for that Purpose (such Passengers or Persons not being borne on the Books as Part of the Ship's Company) shall forfeit the following Sums in addition to the Penalty in the Charter-Party, viz.

For a Male or Female Black Servant, being a Native of India or other Country, the Sum of Twenty Pounds.

For an European, or for a Native of India, bring the Child of a European, Five Hundred Pounds.

THAT in order to prevent the great Expences which have fallen upon the Company by returning Black Servants who have been discharged by their Masters and Mistresses after they have been some Time in England, and with a View of enforcing the Court's present Orders for taking Bonds in India as a Security for the Charges attending the return of such Servants, those Bonds be transmitted to the Commander of the Ship on which they are to embark, with the Order for his receiving the Servants on Board; that the necessary Directions be transmitted to the several Presidencies, to Canton and St. Helena accordingly. That the Commanders be enjoined to refuse receiving the Servants unless the Order is accompanied with the Security Bonds; and if a Commander disobeys the Court's Commands in this Instance, he be subject to the same Penalties as for bringing home Servants without Leave. That upon his arrival in England, he do deliver the Order and Bonds to the Clerk to the Committee of Private Trade.

THAT in pursuance of the several Penalties respecting Passengers above-mentioned, if a Commander disobeys any of the above Regulations, he shall be liable to Suspension during the Pleasure of the Court for the first Offence, and liable to Dismission from the Company's Service for the second Offence.

THAT this Court will consider every Commander guilty of a Breach of their Orders, and consequently liable to their Discipline and to the before-mentioned Penalties, who shall enter on his Books any Person not absolutely intended as a Part of the Ship's Company, or shall connive at or suffer any one to proceed on board his Ship under a feigned or fictitious Character.

THAT the Copper be weighed at the Merchant's House or Wharf, and in the Presence of the Purser, one of the Company's Officers from *Batavia Wharf*, and the Merchant's Clerk, as hitherto practised; and that an Iron Hoop be fixed on the Inside of each Case, that the gross Weight and the Tare be cut on the Case, and that an Account be taken at the same Time of the Number of each Package with the gross Weight, Tare and net Weight thereof and Number of Pieces contained in it; that it be recommended to the Owners to cause each Package to be reweighed immediately on its being received on board the Ship, in Presence of the Commanding Officer, the Master of the Craft, the Surveyor who has Charge of her, and, at least, one of the Surveyors on Duty on board the Ship; and in case the gross Weight of any Package differs from the gross Weight marked thereon, such Package be returned to *Batavia Wharf* by the Commanding Officer, with an Account of the Number of it, and the Weight as taken on board the Ship, signed by him, and by the other Persons who saw it weighed; and that on such Occasion, the Warehouse-keeper at *Batavia Wharf* do examine the Package, and take such other Steps as may discover the Cause of such Difference in Weight, and immediately report all the Particulars he shall obtain, to the Committee of Shipping, unless it shall clearly appear to him to have been owing to a Mistake in the original Weight, which may be easily discovered by the Condition of the Chest and the Number of Pieces of Copper contained in it.

THAT it be also recommended to the Owners to give Orders that the Cases of Copper be weighed again when delivered out of the Ship in *India*, and an Account of the Weights taken.

THAT

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THAT Directions be sent to the several Presidencies, to cause the Copper to be weighed immediately on its being landed, and that the Commander, or some Person appointed by him on the Part of the Owners, be required to attend the Weighing. That whenever it shall be found impracticable to weigh it immediately, it be secured under two Locks, and that the Commander or Person appointed by him, have Possession of the Key of one of the Locks, 'till the Whole of the Copper shall be weighed.

THAT if any Package shall, on weighing it, appear deficient, the Number of such Package, with the gross Weight and Tare as marked on the Outside, be stated in the Account Deficiency tendered to the Commander, for his Signature, and that he be allowed to make such reasonable Objections to the Account, as he may think proper, and that the Import Warehouse-keeper do certify on the Face of the Account, whether such Objections are well founded, or not, and to add such Remarks thereon, as shall enable the Committee of Private Trade to determine whether the Deficiencies should in Justice be charged to the Owners or not.

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the Cargo of said foreign ships higher measure than a Ton
That three days at least shall be observed to
said Company for shipping Private Trade Goods on board of such

The Court of Directors of the East India Company have had under their consideration your letter of the 7th ultimo, acquainting them by command of the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury that the Trustees under his Majesty's Grant of the Bury captured in India, have represented, that certain Sums, which you specify amounting to Rupees 5693.102.14.91 appear to have fallen into the hands of the Company's Officers in consequence of the operations of the late War in the Deccan, and are consequently the Property of the Crown

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as Bury; and requesting that the Court will cause the said Sums to be paid to the Trustees, who have informed their Lordships that they will call upon Sir Thomas Hopley to furnish them with returns of the Troops employed in the Captivities, including those of Lieutenant Colonel Arthur's Detachment; and that as soon as they should receive these Returns they will submit to the Board a Scheme of Distribution of the Amount.

I have now the Command of the Court to state to you in reply, for submission to their Lordships, that, in pursuance of the adjudication now announced, the Court will immediately prepare Instructions to the Government

of Bengal, Madras & Bombay calling upon them to pay over to the Trustees appointed by His Majesty's then Agents the sums deposited in the respective Treasuries of those Governments as specified in your letter.

I am at the same time commanded by the Court to draw the attention of their Lordships to the circumstance of a claim to a considerable amount made by Harobah Outay to a part of the sum deposited in the Bombay Treasury as being private property belonging to him and for the recovery of which he has instituted a suit in India which is still pending and the Court presume that their Lordships will be pleased either to direct a provision to be made to

answer this claim if it shall be established or to acquiesce in some other arrangement which may prevent the danger of the sum so claimed being paid away before it is clearly established to be properly the subject of a grant from the Crown.

I am also directed to remind you that in the account transmitted in my letter of the 9th December from which the items mentioned in your letter of the 27th ult. appear to be extracted, a large diamond estimated at 130,000 Rupees is included and stated to be in this House, but respecting which no directions are given by your letter.
