SIR,

I HAVE the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter dated 16th ultimo, No. 173, recommending the transfer of the Rajpootana Agency to the Bombay Government on the ground, *1stly*, of the frequency of robberies in the Cantonment of Neemuch; *2ndly*, of the want of proper communication between the Officers in contiguous Districts acting under different authorities; and *3rdly*, of the difficulty, under the present divided Jurisdiction, of deciding the frequent boundary disputes between Goozerat and Rajpootana.

2. In reply, I am directed by the Governor General in Council to state, for the information of the Bombay Government, that the first argument brought forward in support of their proposal is one which indicates the absence of ordinary precautions and vigilance in the Neemuch Cantonments; that when these were employed, the evil complained of ceased; that so far as the Cantonments are concerned, in which no Native Chief has any Jurisdiction, the organization of a good Police is the proper remedy for the alleged evil; and that outside of Cantonments, where Scindia's Jurisdiction is in force, it is difficult to conceive in what respect Scindia's hands would be strengthened in an effective control over the Neemuch District by its transfer to the political control of the Bombay Government. Setting aside the feelings with which such a proposition would be received by Scindia, who has always been under the Government of India, it would place him under two masters; and it is not clear that, where it is desirable to bring political influence to bear on Scindia, with a view to the greater efficiency of his Police and the suppression of crime outside of Cantonments, the Bombay Government could produce a greater impression upon Scindia than the Government of India.

3. With respect to the second argument, I am desirous to point out that, even under the supposition that the inconvenience arising from want of proper communication between the Officers in contiguous Districts acting under different authorities were far more serious than it is, the public service would not, in this respect, be benefitted by substituting upwards of 1,200 miles of new boundary instead of about 250 miles to which at most the objection, even if valid, now applies. When, instead of 250 miles with the Government of India, the Bombay Government should have 1,200 additional miles of

frontier of political superintendency, conterminous with Bhawalpore, the Punjab Government, the Government of the North-Western Provinces and the States of Central India under the political superintendency of the Government of India, the occasions for the experience of the inconvenience of which the Bombay Government complains would be multiplied not only in the ratio of the length of boundary, but also of the separate Governments with which the boundary came into contact.

4. The facts of the particular instance, quoted in paragraph 3 of your letter, are there stated in the Despatch to the Bombay Government, No. 3999, dated 8th September 1860, from which it will be seen that the Bombay Government had chiefly themselves to blame for the inconvenience caused. And it is not alleged that, since the orders were issued by the Government of India, for the Frontier Officers to keep each other informed "of every thing likely to disturb the peace of the Frontier Districts, and of any movement of Troops in the vicinity," any further inconvenience has been felt.

5. The case quoted in paragraph 4 of your letter is that referred to in the correspondence noted in the margin. Since this correspondence took place, Captain Tyrwhitt has been appointed Political Superintendent of Thurr and Parker under the Governor in Council of Bombay; and it is not alleged that any further inconvenience has been felt.

6. With regard to the third argument, I am desired to observe that the boundary disputes between Goozerat and Rajpootana are, as compared with those on the frontiers of Rajpootana and Central India, trifling and unimportant; and that consequently, instead of diminishing its difficulties, the Bombay Government would very largely increase them. It is presumed that the disputes alluded to are those to which the

correspondence marginally noted relates. If the disputes were not of such a nature as to require the deputation of a Special Officer, they can scarcely furnish an argument on which to base a proposal for the transfer of the Rajpootana Agency to Bombay. It is not alleged that any inconvenience has been felt since the appointment of Captain Hayward in June last. With reference also to the case referred to in the 6th paragraph of your letter, any delay or inconvenience which may have been felt in regard to the negotiations for clearing the Ahmedabad and Neemuch road, arose, as you have been already informed, from your neglecting to state precisely what the Governor in Council of Bombay expected the Supreme Government to do.

7. The Governor General in Council directs me to observe that the reasons adduced for the proposed change are not only insufficient, but are mainly of the Bombay Government's causing. His Excellency in Council is of opinion that a division between the Political and the Military authority is not necessarily productive of inconvenience, for none arises therefrom either in Nagpore or Pegu; but if it be desirable to relieve the Bombay Troops from Neemuch and Nusseerabad, the measure can be carried out without any difficulty, as both the Punjab and the Oudh Governments have more Troops than they require, and it will be a far easier mode of diminishing

the chances of any conflict or want of intercommunication among conterminous authorities than would be the transfer of Rajpootana to Bombay.

8. I am desired to add that there are other and broader grounds for refusing to entertain the proposal than the insufficiency of the reasons furnished for it, but it is not considered necessary to enter into these. Suffice it to say, that the severance of a Native Chief's connection and communications with the Governor General, and the transfer of these to a subordinate Government, has been found to be a change in the highest degree distasteful to such Chief; and that the Governor General in Council has no reason to believe that it would be less so in the case of the high Rajpoot Chiefs than in other cases.

SIR,

I HAVE received and laid before the Governor General in Council your letter dated 31st ultimo, No. 194, submitting copy of a communication from the Government, North-Western Provinces, regarding Police jurisdiction in Nusseerabad. The Governor in Council of Bombay refers to this as furnishing "a further illustration of the inconvenience arising from the division of authority in Rajpootana. It will be apparent," it is added, "that the Governor General's Agent exercises in one and the same Circle of Territory extensive political authority, while the Government of the North-Western Provinces have jurisdiction in Police matters, and the Military Cantonments are occupied by Troops under the orders of the Government of this Presidency."

2. But I am directed to observe, that there is no division between the Political and the Police Authorities; for the Agent to the Governor General who exercises the political authority under the Governor General in Council, is also in Civil matters a Commissioner under the Lieutenant-Governor of the North-Western Provinces. There is, therefore, no likelihood of conflict between the Police and the Political Authorities, and there need be none between the Police and the Bombay Military Authorities in Nusseerabad any more than there is between the Police and the Madras Military Authorities in Kamptee or Rangoon.

3. If, however, the Military at Nusseerabad cannot keep their Cantonments in order, His Excellency the Governor General in Council is willing to re-place them by Troops of the Bengal Presidency, as already stated in the 7th paragraph of the letter from this Department, dated 21st ultimo, No. 207.

Her Majesty's Government in thinking that even on that far lower ground of administrative convenience the transfer is not to be desired, as one conducive to the public interests.

Sir,
With reference to your letter No. 678, dated 18th February last, in which the Government of Bombay consented to the inclusion of Police arrangements for the Cantonment of Nasirabad in the general Police arrangements for the District of Ajmer, I am directed to forward for the consideration of His Excellency the Governor General in Council, the accompanying copy of a letter from the Personel Assistant to the Inspector General of Police in these Provinces, soliciting orders on certain points connected therewith.

2nd It appears that things are very differently ordered in the Cantonment of Nasirabad, to what they are in other Cantonments in these Provinces. In addition to the Municipal funds, the sums realized from the excise, from the Income Tax, and from Stamps, are devoted to local improvements.

3rd The Inspector General, therefore, recommends that the entire jurisdiction in the Cantonment be transferred to this Government, that is to say,

the

the Judicial Court of the Cantonment Joint Magistrate and the revenues of the Cantonment, including the Government revenue and the Municipal funds. Otherwise the sources from which the cost of the Police and Judicial Establishments have been defrayed will remain with the Bombay Government, and this Government will have to apply to the Government of India for a special grant of Rupees 11,652 - 4 - 0 for the maintenance of the Police.

4 The proposal seems to the Lieutenant Governor to be reasonable, and, in fact, a necessary consequence of the Police jurisdiction having been made over to this Government. It seems anomalous, too, to His Honor, that the revenues of a Cantonment, situated in the heart of one of the Districts subordinate to this Government, should be vested in the hands of another Government, or devoted to local improvements, contrary to the rules under which the revenues of other Cantonments in these Provinces are expended. In all the rest of these, the produce of the Income Tax, the Excise and the Stamps, and considered and form a part of the Imperial revenue.

5 Captain Chesshyne's return No 2, gives an average account of the Cantonment income and expenditure. In the income are shown excise, Income Tax and Stamp Revenues of Govt. as well as Municipal Funds. If these are separated, the Government Revenue will be 26,730 Rs. viz.

The municipal fund will then amount to 5368.12.

6 In the North Western Provinces the Municipal or Local Agency funds, bear all charges on account of the conservancy or Local improvement of such town. This does not however appear to be the case in Bombay. On the contrary, the State Revenues raised in the Cantonment of Maserabad, are applied

applied in meeting Local improvements, and are credited to the same accounts with Local funds.

7 The Government of Bombay, having consented to transfer Police jurisdiction to the M.P. Government, the Inspector General apprehends, that the transfer should extend to the Judicial Court of the Cantonment Joint Magistrate, and to a transfer of the Government Revenues, and of Municipal Funds.

8 If otherwise, the Cantonment Joint Magistrate in his judicial capacity, will be under the Bombay Government and the sources from which the Police and Judicial Establishments, have been defrayed, will remain with the Bombay Government whilst the charges on account of the Police will fall on the M.P. Government.

9 Captain Currie in one letter reports, that the Cantonment Magistrate of Maserabad, is now subject to all the Regulations of the Bombay Presidency, and that it will be necessary, from the date from which the new arrangements may take effect, that he should be instructed to conform to the system established in the M.P. (Para: 3 of 26 of 21 of March).

10 Should the Bombay Government or the Government of India, to whom perhaps application must be made, consent to this entire transfer of revenues and charges, and of Judicial as well as Police administration. Orders will then be necessary, as to the separation of Government accounts, from those of the Municipality. Whatever portion of the Govt. Revenue

Revenue may be applied to cost of fixed Establish-
 or to defrayment of contingent Charges, should rest
 on sanction of Government and subject to audit
 of Civil Pay Master and entered in Budget and
 Imperial Accounts whilst the account of the
 Cantonment or Bazaar Funds should be separate-
 ly rendered, as elsewhere in the NW Provinces

of your letter No 411 A dated the
21st May last, forwarding an
application from the Inspector
General of Police in the N. W.
Provinces for the transfer, to the
Govt of that Presidency, of the
control exercised by the Bombay
Govt over the Cantonment funds,
as well as of the Cantonment
Magistrates' Courts at Maseerah.

2nd In reply, I am desired to state that no such office as Cantonment Magistrate of Nussacerabad is recognised by the Bombay Regulations. The Superintendent of Baxars has Magisterial power under Regⁿ 22 of 1827 subordinate to the Military Authorities, and while the Military command of the troops at Nussacerabad is vested in the Commander in Chief of the Bombay Army, it appears to this Govt very

undesirable that any system foreign to that in force in this Presidency should be introduced.

3^d The collection ~~of~~ of the Cantonment revenues is also a subject so intimately connected with the interior military arrangements of the station that their transfer to the Govt of the N. W. Provinces would, it is apprehended, lead to considerable embarrassment.

4 His Govt consented in February last to leave the Police arrangements of the Cantonment of Maseerabad in the hands of the Civil Officers under the Govt of the N. W. Provinces for the reasons contained in the accompaniment to your letter N 1255-A dated the 6th December 1861, and His Excy. in Council will be prepared to remit to the Govt of the N. W. Provinces each year the cost of the purely Police force kept up for the Maseerabad Cantonment; the jurisdiction over the Cantonment in all other matters being left

with the Bombay Government so long as Maseerabad shall remain a station of the Bombay Army.

5 In para. 2 of your letter under acknowledgment it is stated that "the sums realized from the excise, from the Income tax and from stamps are devoted to local improvements." This, I am desirous to remark, is not the case, the fact being that a small fraction only of the revenue of the Maseerabad Cantonment is devoted, under Govt orders, to the local wants, while the gross receipts are credited to the State in the Books of the Military Pay Master and the Collector. In ~~all~~ the Military Cantonments in this Presidency, with the exception of Kurrachee, ^{where the system is under trial} ~~all funds~~ ^{are} raised for purely Municipal purposes. In continuation of the endorsement from this
Department 412 A dated the 21st of May last, I am
directed to forward to you the accompanying copy of
a letter from the Acting Secretary to the Government of
Bombay No. 2411 dated the 28th ultimo, relative to the
jurisdiction exercised by that Government in the Cantonment
of Mussurahad, and to communicate the following remarks.

1st The Lieutenant Governor thinks that the views
taken by the Bombay Government may be resisted, for
there can be no more reason why the Mussurahad Can-
tonment should remain under the management of the Bombay
Government, because it is held by Bombay troops, than
that Jabulpoor and Sangor, which were at one time held
by Madras Troops, should not be made over in consequence
to the Madras Government. If the principle advocated
by the Bombay Government were right, then Canton-
ment Funds, the Excise and Income Tax of Khamptee and
Rangoon, respectively, should be withdrawn from the
Chief Commissioner of the Central Provinces, and British
Burmah, respectively.

3rd Further, it might be observed, with reference to
para 2 of Mr Shaw Stewart's letter that Regulation

170
XXII of 1827 of the Bombay Code can have no legal or valid currency in a portion of the Ajmere District, which does not belong to the Bombay Presidency. The District of Ajmere, within which the Mussenabad Cantonment is situate, is not, it is true, a Regulation District, but, if any Law is applicable to it, that must be the Law of the Presidency within which it lies. And this consideration extends itself to the realisation of the Excise Revenue, which should be quided in Mussenabad, as in all other Cantonments of the North Western Provinces, not by the Bombay Law and practice, but by the Law and practice which obtains in the North Western Provinces.

4th The Income Tax Law, and the Stamp Law are the same throughout India, and the like consideration does not apply. But it might still be a question whether this Government is not entitled to credit for the proceeds of these Taxes, as well as for all Revenue, of whatever kind, realised in territory, which belongs to its jurisdiction.

5th The Lieut. Governor nevertheless does not wish to oppose the wish of the Bombay Government, as expressed in the letter under notice, if they should desire to adhere to it. Were not Mussenabad a part of a Non Regulation District, His Honor would be disposed to press the transfer of its administration to this Government, on the ground of the want of jurisdiction on the part of the Bombay Govt., and the inapplicability of Bombay Regulations to a portion of a District belonging to the North Western Provinces. As the case stands, however, and as it must certainly, the Lieut. Governor readily admits, be convenient to the Bombay Government that, while the Troops of that Presidency occupy Mussenabad, they should have in their own hands the administration of the Cantonment, the Lieut. Governor is prepared to accept the proposal offered in the 4th para; of Mr. Shaw Stewart's letter. But before giving a final reply to this effect, the Lieutenant Governor would wish you to inform

him, whether, in your opinion, the confusion of account which you apprehend will not be effectually averted by the Bombay Government meeting the cost of the Mussenabad Cantonment Police to this Government; and whether, the management of the Police being entirely in Captain Carnell's hands, the judicial business may not be left, as now, in the hands of Captain Cheshyre the Superintendent of Bagaro, without much risk of collision of authority.
