Notes of a conversation with Mr. D. N. Sen, Principal of the B. N. College, Novr., 6, 1912.

Extract.

Congress. Mr. Sen enquired whether if the leaders of the Congress, which is to be held immediately after Christmas, asked for students to be employed as so-called volunteers he should acquiesce in the request. The object of the appointment of these volunteers is ostensibly to preserve order and look after the quests. I told him that the reply was emphatically in the negative, as such intervention in politics is obviously contrary to the terms of the Risley circular. It will probably be desirable to issue a circular on the subject with the regard to the numerous college students and high school boys of this town. It may also be desirable that the Commissioner, who is in close touch with the leading Congress members of the province, shauld speak to them on the subject as the Magistrate, Mr. Weston, is a new-comer.

He further enquired what was permissible for College Professors in the matter. I replied that as far as Government Colleges were concerned it was open to Professors as members of the general public to attend any public meetings which were not of a disloyal or seditious character, but that it was not desirable that they should take part in the proceedings or be office-bearers. With regard to Aided Colleges, the restrictions on the freedom of the professors were of a similar character. It would be open to the Professors of an aided College to attend such meetings and, if there were no thing objectionable in the character of the proceedings, even to take part in them, but that Government would have a right to object and would certainly object if they told and in any anything of a disloyal tendency or took part in a discussion of any such character. I do not think, however, that it is either necessary or desirable to issue any special instruction with regard to the attitude of the College Profisors.

Sir,

I have the honour to address you on the subject of the participation of students in the proceedings of the forth-students & schoolboys coming Congress at Patna. By the terms of the Government of India Home Department Circular No. 332 dated May 4, 1907, while schoolboys are forbidden to attend any political meetings or to engage in any form of political agitation, students of college, though not prohibited from mere attendance at political meetings, are not allowed to take an active part in their proceedings. The enrolment of any college students as 'volunteers' so-called in connection with the meetings of the Congress would constitute "taking an active part in the proceedings" and is therefore forbidden. Any infraction of this prohibition should be at once brought to my notice for such disciplinary action as may be required.
