SIR,

I am directed to forward herewith a copy of the History Sheet of one Bairagi Charan Paramagarn of Patiagora, post office Chandaka, Puri; and to enquire whether, on an examination of the same, His Honour the Lieutenant Governor would have any objection if an order were passed by the Bengal Government under rule 3(a) of the Defence of India (Consolidation) Rules, 1915, prohibiting this suspect from entering or residing in Bengal. If Bairagi Tripathi were expelled from Bengal, and took up his residence in his house in Orissa, the restrictions to be imposed upon him might be such as the Government of Bihar and Orissa might consider proper.

14 History Sheet of Bairagi Tripathi alias B. Tripathi.

Bairagi Tripathi is the son of Ananda Charan Paramaguru of Patiagora, Post Office Chandaka, Puri. He is aged about 24 years. He was educated in the Ravenshaw College, Cuttack and the St. Xavier's College, Calcutta. He has been living in different messes in Calcutta including No.29 Sri Gopal Mullick's Lane, which was searched in connection with the murder of Head Constable Haripada Deb in 1913. At present he is a private tutor to the sons of Babu Jahar Lal Neogi of 28/2 Jugipara Lane, for which he is given free board and lodging and a small remuneration as pocket money. He is a member of the Rakkrishna Mission and it is believed by the Bihar Special Branch that he may be responsible for a seditious letter which was sent to the Maharaja of Jhind.

Among his associates may be mentioned:-

- (1) Amarendra Nath Chatarji of the Sramjibi Samabaya and of the German Indian plot (now absconding).
- (2) Sham Sunder Chakravarty, (interned).
- (3) Girindra Nath Banarji) of the Rodda's) Both in-
- (4) Anukul Chandra Mukherji) Arms Case) terned.
and
- (5) Leakut Hosein.

He first came to our notice in 1913 when he spoke at a meeting held in Beadon Square presided over by the notorious Amarendra Nath Chatarji, referred to above. Ever since Leakut Horsein was served with an order under Section 62 of the Calcutta Police Act, Tripathi has always spoken very vehemently at the meetings organised by Leakut and himself on almost all political questions including 'Nationalism' 'Burdwan Floods' 'War and the present duty of Indians' 'Internments' 'Arms Act' &c., &c.,

At a meeting held at Beadon Square on the 29th. May 1915 he said 'Starvation was a thing unknown before the advent of the English'. At his speech in the same square on the 21st. December he said that the 'Police of today are more inefficient than in the days gone by'.

On the 19th. of the same month he reerrred to the

dacoities in Calcutta and said 'Police activities are most unsatisfactory now-a-days'. The people of this country should bring to the notice of Government that in the Police department now-a-days, only nephews, brothers and uncles of superior officers serving under Government are enlisted and this is one of the main causes of the inefficiency of the Police staff".

In the same year, at a meeting in connection with the Madrassa Hostel duty Fund under the Presidency of the Hon'ble Mr. Beatson Bell, the Hon'ble Nawab Syed Shamsul Huda stopped Tripathi from speaking further when he broached the subject of Hindu Muhammadan unity and the country's cause.

Again at a famine relief meeting held under the Presidency of Babu Ambika Charan Mazumdar of Faridpur, Tripathi spoke vehemently criticising the report of the Hon'ble Mr. Beatson Bell on the Tipperah famine.

Early this year (2.1.1916) he attacked the policy of Government in introducing the Arms Act in India and thus making Indians helpless against the attacks of the dacoits.

On the 21st. November 1916 at a meeting organised by Leakut Hosein, Tripathi characterised the present internments as "most unjustifiable and oppressive". He added that hundreds of innocent students and respectable people of Bengal and of other provinces have been interned and that he knew some such persons who had no connection whatever with the anarchists but had been interned simply on the vague reports of irresponsible Police officers. He also challenged the C.I.D officer present at the meeting to report to his superior officers that Tripathi held this meeting and made this speech.

He is undoubtedly a virulent and impressive speaker and his speeches at the present time, will, in my opinion, do more harm than ever.



Whereas in the opinion of the Governor in Council there are reasonable grounds for believing that Bairagi Tripathi, son of Ananda Bharan Paramaguru of Patiagora, post office Chandaka, Puri, in Bihar and Orissa has acted in a manner prejudicial to the public safety and is likely to act in such manner.

Now therefore the Governor, ^{in Council} in exercise of the power conferred on him by Rule 3 (a) of the Defence of India (Consolidation) Rules, 1915, published in the Government of India's Notification No. 86 dated the 9th December 1915, is pleased to direct that the said Bairagi Tripathi shall quit Bengal and shall not re-enter, reside or remain in any area within the limits of the Presidency of Bengal. He is hereby given seven days from the service of this order to leave the Presidency of Bengal.

And ~~xxx~~ the said Bairagi Tripathi is hereby warned that if he knowingly disobeys any direction in this order he will be liable to the penalty prescribed by rule 5 of the Defence of India (Consolidation) Rules, 1915, a copy of which rule is attached to this order.

Bairagi Tripathi son of Ananda Tripathi alias Paramguru.

(1) You are hereby directed to report yourself to the Superintendent of Police, Cuttack.

(2) You are further directed to allow your photograph and finger-prints to be taken under the direction of the said officer.

(3) You must also furnish as many specimens of your handwriting and signature as may be required by that officer.

(4) You are thereafter directed to proceed to the Sadr police station of Cuttack and report yourself to the officer in charge of the police station at such time and place as the Superintendent of Police may direct.

(5) You must reside until further orders in the premises to be selected and defined under the orders of the Superintendent of Police.

(6) You are prohibited from ^(being absent from) leaving these premises between the hours of 6 P.M. and 6 A.M. and from receiving any visitors between these hours.


(7) You must receive no visitors other than persons residing within the limits of the Sadr police station of Cuttack without the permission to be previously obtained from the District Magistrate of Cuttack.

- (8) You must allow the police officer in charge of the police station of Cuttack to inspect your correspondence and you must produce the same at any time at his request.
- (9) You are forbidden from holding or taking part in any public meeting whatsoever ~~in the District of Cuttack.~~
- (10) You must report yourself personally once a day at such hour as may be specified by the Superintendent of Police to the officer in charge of the police station, Cuttack.
- (11) You must at all times allow free access to the premises in which you are living to the officer in charge of the Cuttack police station for the time being and to any Magistrate or police officer superior in rank to the officer in charge of the police station.
- (12) If you are at any time unable by reason of severe sickness or other serious infirmity to report yourself as directed in paragraph (9), you must give immediate intimation of your inability to do so to the officer in charge of the Cuttack police station, and you must permit such officer or his deputy to enter your premises and by personal examination satisfy himself as to the correctness of your statement.
- (13) If you knowingly disobey any direction in this order other than that contained in paragraphs (2) and (3) you will be punishable with imprisonment of either description for a term which may extend to three years and will also be liable to fine. For failure to comply with or attempts to evade any directions given in paragraphs (2) and (3) you will be punishable with imprisonment of either description for a term which may extend to six months or with fine which may extend to Rs.1000 or with both.

With reference to Mr Johnston's letter No. 943 C,
dated the 29th March 1917, regarding the allowance to be
given to the political suspect Bairagi Tripathy interned
at Chowliagunj, Cuttack, I have the honour to report that
at my request the District Magistrate of Cuttack enquired
into the matter and has recommended an allowance of Rs. 45/
a month to the political suspect and his family as noted
below from the dates of his internment i.e. the 6th
February 1917.

Maintenance charge of the political suspect himself. Rs. 15

family consisting of his old father and mother, a
boy 5 years old (a relative of the family staying

the political suspect gets an allowance of 1/2 per
diem from the Zamindar of Patia as his family priest
and has only about 2 acres of land which have been

2. Having regard to the high prices of living and the increased remuneration now charged by domestic servants I recommend a consolidated allowance of Rs.50 a month to the political suspect and his family with effect from the 6th February 1917. A copy of the suspect's statement recorded by my Personal Assistant is enclosed.

3. As the suspect has ~~not~~ not been paid any allowance for three months and as I have reason to believe in real straits, I request that early orders may be communicated to me and to the Accountant General for the information of the local Treasury Officer. I may add that I asked the Collector-Magistrate to advance a sum equal to the arrears which have accrued since the date of internment but the Treasury Officer has refused to pass the bill without express orders of Government.

Babu Bairagi Tripathi, son of Babu Ananda Chandra

Paramanguru of Patia, district Cuttack states:-

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I was formerly Editor of the "Students' Magazine" and the daily Bengali edition of the "Hablul Matin" in Calcutta (8, Canning Street, and Bowbazar Street - close to 'Basumati Office'). I first of all joined the Hablul Matin office where I used to get Rs.70/- a month. When I left this office I edited the Students' Magazine, by which I made about Rs.60/- a month. Besides I earned about Rs. 40/- a month as private tutor to the sons of Zamindar Jahar Lal Neogi, No.12 Malanga Lane, and Radhanath Dutta, 26 Banchharam Akkur's Lane. For a time I gave up connection with the Students' Magazine and had to depend upon the above private tuitions alone. My monthly income varied from Rs. 40/- to Rs. 100/- just before I was interned on the 6th February 1917. Since then I have been residing in Chauliaganj village where I cannot find any work to do. I am the only earning member of my family consisting of four members - my mother, father, brother and myself. My father is old and diseased and unable to earn. Our ancestral lands were sold at a auction when my grandfather died. I have not married. My age is 23 years. My younger brother is 20, has very little education and stops with my

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parents. He earns nothing. I passed the Entrance
Examination from the Seal's Free College, Calcutta and
read up to the 2nd year class in St. Xavier's College.

I have been paid no allowance since my internment. I
applied to the Superintendent of Police Cuttack, who
enquired what I wanted. I submitted written applications
to Messrs. Feeny and Randle, but have received no orders
yet.
