In connection with the distribution of the Indian Civil Service recruits at the open competition for 1912, the Government of India in paragraph 3 of their letter No. 1509—17, dated the 10th August 1912, directed that indents regarding the number of candidates to be selected each year may in future be furnished to the Government of India in accordance with the instructions contained in paragraph 6 of the Home Department letter to the Government of Bengal, No. 54, dated 27th January 1900. As laid down therein a report on the number of recruits to be indented for at the open competition of 1913 is now due to the Government of India. Apparently the Government of India do not want us to follow the rate of recruitment prescribed in that paragraph as it has since been changed.

2. In Home Department letter, No. 270, dated 20th March 1912, the total sanctioned strength of the Indian Civil Service in Bihar and Orissa was fixed at 106. This was exclusive of the appointment of the member of the Board of Revenue and in consequence of the decision of the Secretary of State to permit the retention of one appointment of member of the Board of Revenue the number of superior appointments in Bihar and Orissa was raised to 54 and the sanctioned strength to 109. Proposals have already been submitted to the Government of India for a separate Judgeship at Monghyr and a Secretaryship to the Board of Revenue. We have no information yet whether these appointments will be sanctioned and, if so, whether either or both of them will be listed. We may perhaps, frame our estimates for the Indian Civil Service recruits to be indented for on the basis of our present cadre,

3. The present sanctioned strength is 109. The actual strength on the 1st July 1912 (it is usual to begin with the number in July of the preceding year) was 108. The estimated number of casualties at the rate of 4.17 per cent. on the actual strength, which is now the accepted rate, is 4.5, and for the two years 1912-13 and 1913-14, is 9. Five recruits arrived in 1912 and five more are expected in 1913. Deducting from 108, 9 as the estimated number of casualties and adding 10 as new recruits, the actual strength on the 1st July 1914 is expected to be $108 - 9 + 10 = 109$. There will thus be neither excess nor deficiency in our cadre in its present strength of 109.

4. At the normal rate of recruitment at 4.17 per cent. of the strength of 109, we are entitled to 4.54 new recruits for 1913 and also 30 per cent. of the deficiency, if any. As noted above there will be no deficiency in our cadre in its present strength of 109. Assuming however that the Government of India will sanction our proposal to the creation of a separate Judgeship for Monghyr and a Secretaryship for the Board of Revenue and that one of these new appointments will be open to the Provincial Civil Service, the total number of superior appointments open to the Indian Civil Service will be 55 and the total strength will be 110.86 or 111. As calculated above the actual strength on the 1st July 1914 is expected to be 109. There will therefore be a probable deficit of two in the cadre of 111. Adding 30 per cent. of this deficit or .6 to the number previously arrived at, the number of candidates to be recruited in 1913 works to 5.14. We may perhaps ask for the recruitment of five officers.

5. The question regarding the transfer of two junior civilians from Bihar and Orissa to Bengal is pending with the Government of India. The above calculations have been made on the assumption that the Government of India will agree to our proposal that we should

not be required to transfer two officers from this province to Bengal. But if the Government of India decide it otherwise, there will be 2 more deficits. Adding 30 per cent. of this deficit or '6 to the number arrived at in the last but two lines in paragraph 4, the number of candidacies to be recruited in 1913, works out to $5 \cdot 14 + \cdot 6 = 5 \cdot 74$ or 6.

I think it is simpler for us to calculate our wants on the present sanctioned cadre and then point out the contingencies which may entitle us to more saying that we do not know what orders India will pass on these matters and they will no doubt revise our estimate in accordance with them. Draft on these lines, please, briefly.

Draft for approval which is I think self-explanatory. The reference to allowance for excess and deficit in paragraph 2 is explained in the office note. If the calculations showed we were understrength we should be entitled to add 30 per cent. of the deficiency to our estimate, if we had to anticipate too many officers, we should have to subtract the same percentage.

I am directed to submit the following estimate of the number of candidates for the Indian Civil Service to be recruited at the open competition of 1913 for Bihar and Orissa.

2. The sanctioned strength of the Indian Civil Service in Bihar and Orissa is at present 109 and the actual strength on the 1st July 1912 (exclusive of Mr. Greer, who was subsequently transferred from Bengal with effect from April 1st but never served in the new province) was 108. The estimated number of casualties at the rate of 4.17 per cent. per annum on the actual strength for the two years 1912-13 and 1913-14, is 9. Five recruits arrived in 1912 and five are expected in 1913. Allowing for 9 casualties and 10 new recruits, the actual strength on the 1st July 1914 will be 109.

3. As this is the present sanctioned strength, no allowance has to be made for excess or defect; and on the assumption that nothing occurs to upset these calculations, the Lieutenant-Governor in Council recommends that 5 candidates (4.17 of $109 = 4.54$), should be selected at the open competition of 1913 for Bihar and Orissa. Applications have, however, been made to the Government of India for the creation of the posts of Secretary to the Board of Revenue and District and Sessions Judge (for Monghyr), and inclusive of these and the inferior appointments to balance them, the sanctioned strength in Bihar and Orissa would be 113. The Government of India have also under their consideration the question whether any of the junior members of the service should be transferred to Bengal and their decision may also affect the above calculations. As the Lieutenant-Governor in Council cannot anticipate the decision at which the Government of India may arrive on these references, I am to request that the present estimate may, if necessary, be revised in accordance with the orders which may be passed.
